WELCOME



The 4th EAPC research forum is driven and shaped by your contributions. We look forward to learning and discussing new data, hypothesis, and methods in an atmosphere of respect and collaboration among the variety of professionals from multiple disciplines, professions, research settings, and nationalities. There is enough space and time for focusing on sessions, meeting people, and establishing fruitful contacts.

As the forum starts, it is time to celebrate. We had the privilege to receive proposals for the themed research and plenary session from many members of EAPC. The scientific committee is also very thankful for the speakers' contributions to the scientific programme and the abstract review. Each abstract was reviewed by 3 reviewers, who were blind for the authors and institutions and rated the abstracts as described in the abstract submission procedures. The scientific committee balanced the differences in reviewers' mean scores and selected abstracts for plenary, new research data and poster viewing sessions.

363 posters will be presented in dedicated poster sessions. The poster viewing sessions allow you to both see and show research work, by presenting and visiting half time. There are also opportunities to share lunch with others. Poster guided tours by faculty aim to provide focused education. Two poster discussion sessions focus on the best posters, and 6 poster awards will be handed over.

115 oral presentations are delivered in 16 new research data sessions. The new research data sessions are managed by the chairs to dedicate time to both present and discuss the papers in a productive spirit. 4 abstracts will be presented in plenary together with 3 plenary lectures. Sentinel research developments in palliative care and associated educational aspects will also be emphasized in 10 thematic sessions and 2 satellite workshops offering a total of 43 presentations.

Educational aspects are webbed in the forum. All session speakers and chairs follow rules to acknowledge the educational needs of the variety of participants.

Three pre-conference education sessions tackle issues of research methodology and development of research logistics and networks, clarifying the question: How to perform cuttingedge research?

It is important to get to know other researchers, be inspired by discussions and learn about networks and working groups to stimulate collaborative research.

Morning meet-the-expert/tutorial sessions and opportunities in rooms for informal meetings bring researchers close to other researchers. In the entrance area a meeting spot offers a message board, to place your message alphabetically. The collaborative projects corner is your market place to invite participants to join or participate in your project.

Finally, dedicate moments to enjoy with old and new friends the wonderful place of Venice

EDUCATIONAL SESSIONS

On Thursday morning educational sessions on how to plan, conduct and interpret clinical research, will be offered.

MEET THE EXPERTS AND TUTORIAL SESSIONS

Up to 8 parallel sessions of 45 minutes for each morning with 2 experts per session: an opportunity to meet and to discuss specific research issues. The emphasis lies on expert – participant interaction with limited visual presentations. Participants were invited to indicate their choice prior to the conference or at latest at registration as places are limited.

Poster viewing sessions

The majority of the participants are involved in the presentation of a poster but aim also to visit and discuss other's work. The required time slot to be present at the poster is split and limited to 30 minutes, but please be at this time present at the poster.

Poster guided tours

As a further tutorial opportunity, faculty offers to visit together with a group of participants some faculty-selected posters of an abstract category. The aim is select important posters in the field, but also such of special educational content as judged by the faculty (interesting methodology, results presentation, challenging evolution of research question, etc.).

At the entrance of the **poster area** please <u>write your name</u> in the list, and meet the expert there.

Poster discussion sessions

All posters will be reviewed by the coordinators of the poster discussion sessions, who will select posters for a presentation and discussion of the posters. The posters selected will be announced at a dedicated board in the poster area and authors are kindly invited to check the board and confirm their attendance at the congress secretariat.





Unknown Venice walking tour: Guided tour of the most charming quarter of Venice, the magnificent Church of San Giovanni e Paolo, Venice's unofficial pantheon since it houses the tombs of many doges, the Marco Polo Houses and the Rialto Bridge

Privat visit of St. Mark's Cathedral: By special agreement with the Patriarch of Venice, a private evening visit of St. Mark's Basilica which is one of the most exclusive and unique experience in Venice. In the evening all mosaics are illuminated. The atmosphere and the spirituality is an unforgettable souvenir and of course an elegant touch to the event.

Secret itineraries of the Doge's Palace: In alternative to the classical visit of the Doge's Palace, a special entrance for the visit of the Secrets itineraries of the Palace which are normally closed to the public during the classical visit.



The islands of the lagoon. Murano, Burano and Torcello: Excursion by private GT boat and English speaking escort/guide, sailing on the Northern part of the Lagoon of Venice. You will visit three of the most charming and romantic islands around Venice. Murano, where you will have the chance to visit a glass blowing factory and admire a glass masters' demon-

stration. Burano, which is probably the most unique of the three with its multicoloured houses and famous for its lace school, where the art of making lace is still teached by the last artisans. Torcello, the wild and green island, which was the most ancient village of Venice and where in 639 the magnificent Byzantine Cathedral has been built.



Venetian Rowing Courses and Regattas: Regattas are the most genuinely Venetian of the city's traditions and show its strong ties to the water, a real "rowing competition" The Venetian Regatta.

Treasure Hunt in Venice: A light competition around Venice following an itinerary. Each team will have a different name and will have to fill up a questionnaire which will prepare on purpose with some questions about Venice. Special prizes will be given to the "most funny group picture" or the "nicest draw of Venice" etc. a couple of stops in a Venetian tavernas (called "bacari") will be arranged along the way where guests will enjoy an "ombra" (nice glass of wine) and a "cicheto" (Venetian word to call "tapas").

Bacari Tour: This is a nice and relaxing walking tour accompanied by our escort through Venice, discovering the real Venetian atmosphere by stopping in different "Bacari" (historical Venetian Wine bars) where you will mix with the other Venetians for a glass of wine and some "chicheti" (Venetian appetizers).

The Gondolas: The gondola is perhaps the best-known symbol of Venice. In the sixteenth century, there may have been as many as 10,000 of these long narrow boats plying the canals of Venice, but these days, there are only 450. The bow of the boat is adorned with a ferro, a six-pronged piece of metal (which represent the "6 sestieri" in Venice and he Doge's hat). In Venice you can still find just three "squeri" or gondola yards. One of these, is the Squero of San Trovaso



located in the southwestern portion of Venice where you can see the gondola makers on work.
