

### F2 Depression among patients with advanced disease; Do standardised screening tools improve identification?

### EUROPEAN STANDARDS AND NORMS FOR PALLIATIVE CARE Participant award for online Delphi consensus process

On behalf of the board of directors of the EAPC currently a consensus process on standards and norms for palliative care is being undertaken. The aim is to achieve a Europe-wide consensus on five key areas of palliative care delivery by an online Delphi survey. The process comprises two rounds; the first round has been accomplished in November, 2008, the second round started in April, 2009. The results of the consensus process will be published as EAPC White Paper on standards and norms for palliative care in Europe.

Among all participants of our online consensus process a special award for their participation has been drawn. We are pleased to announce that the winner will gain a free copy of the two top-class standard works in palliative care, the **Oxford Textbook of Palliative Medicine** and the **Oxford Handbook of Palliative Care**.

### **CONGRESS VENUE – AUSTRIA CENTER**

The so called "Danube City" is located across the River Danube in Vienna's northern part. This district represents the "modern Vienna", where several office towers have emerged and where research & development is practiced in the "Vienna Tech-Gate". Right there, at the banks of the river, the "Copa Cagrana" has developed, an assembly of international restaurants, taverns and bars, facing the "Danube Island", a huge recreation area for locals and tourists, home of the annual "Danube Island Music Festival", which attracts more than a million enthusiastic spectators.

Some 30 years ago, this region was vast and empty, a flooding area for the Danube, until the day when Vienna was selected as third headquarter of the United Nations Organisations. Thus, the "UN-City" was erected right there and the Austria Center Vienna was built, as the last construction phase, mainly to hold meetings and conferences of the UN.

Austria's largest conference facility is one of the global players in the meetings industry. Opened in 1987, the ACV can accommodate some 9.500 delegates, seated in 14 lecture rooms (100 – 4.200 theatre style) and 170 small meeting rooms and offices (22 – 165 m²) on four levels. Four purpose-built exhibition halls (12.000 m²) and another 10.000 m² of foyer areas complete the ACV conception of space. From 2003, the ACV has undergone a stepwise refurbishment: heavy wooden panels gave way to bright white walls with contemporary pieces of arts, airy reception & registration counters and inviting foyer bars. Meeting an innovative catering concept, the traditional restaurant has vanished and has been turned into another multipurpose lot, replaced by 9 foyer restaurants, in the immediate vicinity of the lecture rooms.

#### Access to the congress venue

To reach the ACV from the city centre (Stephansplatz) take the U1 underground line. Get off at Vienna International Centre/Kaisermühlen and take the exit marked Schüttaustraße. Travelling time: approx. eight minutes.

Austria's capital offers a unique blend of imperial traditions and stunning modern architecture. It is famous for its cultural events, imperial sights, coffee houses, cosy wine taverns, and the very special Viennese charm.

The city's history dates back to the first post-Christian century when the Romans established the military camp Vindobona. Today's cityscape is characterised by the abundance of baroque buildings created mostly under the rule of Empress Maria Theresia and Emperor Franz Joseph I who was largely responsible for the monumental architecture round the Ringstraße.



Vienna's prime landmarks are the gothic Stephansdom (St. Stephen's Cathedral), the Giant Ferris Wheel in the Prater, Vienna's old recreational park, and the Spanish Riding School with their world-famous Lipizzan horses. Castle Schönbrunn, the former imperial summer residence, belongs to one of the most popular sights as well. The large Hofburg complex (Imperial Palace) was the base of the Habsburgs for over six centuries, and is an impressive repository of culture and heritage. The splendid baroque Belvedere palace today houses the Österreichische Galerie (Austrian Gallery) displaying the largest collection of works by Klimt and Kokoschka as well as famous paintings by Schiele.

Vienna has more museums and galleries of international reputation than one can imagine: Kunsthistorischen Museum with the world's largest collection of Bruegel paintings, Museums-Quartier with Leopold Museum (Schiele), Museum Moderner Kunst (Museum of Modern Art), Architekturzentrum (Architectural Center) and Kunsthalle rank among the cities most important cultural venues. Albertina is home to the world's largest collection of graphic arts and prints, and Liechtenstein Museum presents selected masterpieces from the Princely Collections in Vaduz.

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### **INFORMATION ABOUT VIENNA**



Vienna owes much of its international fame to the many celebrated composer who lived and worked here including Strauß, Mozart, Beethoven, Schubert, and Haydn. The Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra is one of the world's best, the Staatsoper one of the world's leading opera houses, the Vienna Boys' Choir one the world's most famous. In the last years Vienna has also established itself as a great musical metropolis.

### Arrival by plane - Vienna International Airport

Arriving in Vienna by plane, you will reach Vienna International Airport which is located in the south of Vienna. The international airport in the heart of Europe is one of the fastest growing airports in Europe. Not only are there frequent flight connections to all European cities, Vienna International Airport is also a gateway to the booming markets of Central and Eastern Europe. Frequent bus connections to and from Budapest, Györ, Heviz, Bratislava, Brno and Prague are offered.

#### **Getting from the Airport to the City Centre**

CAT – City Airport Train

The quickest and most comfortable way of reaching the city centre of Vienna is the CAT – City Airport Train. It takes only 16 minutes from Vienna International Airport to the City Air Terminal, which is located about 10 minutes walk from the "Stephansdom" directly in the city centre. The train departs every 30 minutes and costs EUR 16.00 roundtrip.

From the City Terminal you can continue easily to your hotel by tram, underground, bus or taxi.






### EXHIBITION FLOOR PLAN – YELLOW AREA
