Summary of the project:	Through the extension of an existing collaboration of colleagues working in end of life care across Europe and beyond, the project aims to explore, share and collate current knowledge and practice in each of the key themes identified within the work programme. It aims to reach consensus (based on current practice and available research evidence) on the optimum care to be delivered in the last days of life and gaps in the knowledge base. In addition, it aims to develop innovative resdearch protocols to address gaps in knowledge and to make recommendations for the further development of the Liverpool Care Pathway for the Dying Patient (LCP) Framework in an international context, with the specific aim of improving care for cancer patients in the last days of life. Clearly, such improvements would also impact positively on their informal carers and health professionals delivering the care. Importantly, it aims to do this systematically and collaboratively across Europe and beyond to integrate knowledge from a range of healthcare environments and cultures and to avoid duplication of resource and effort.  Five seminal themes that are central to the provision of quality care in the last days and hours of life have been identified:  * signs and symptoms of approaching death





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	* end of life decisions  * complementary comfort care  *psychological and psychosocial support for patients, families and caretakers  *voluntary service
Aims (research questions) :	The main aim is to reach consensus (based on current practice and available research evidence) on the optimum care to be delivered in the last days of life and to identify gaps in the knowledge base within each of these themes. In addition, the work will involve the development of innovative ways of addressing gaps in knowledge with the specific aim of improving care for cancer patients in the last days of life. Clearly, such improvements would also impact positively on their informal carers and health professionals delivering the care. Importantly, it aims to do this systematically and collaboratively across Europe and beyond to integrate knowledge from a range of healthcare environments and cultures and to avoid duplication of resource and effort.
Expected Results:	The primary outcomes of the planned project will include:  A comprehensive and systematically evaluated 'state of the art' (published and unpublished literature and expert opinion)  The development of outline research protocols for future research to improve the care for patients in the final days and hours of life  A list of evaluated 'technologies' in each of the work package areas to provide practitioners with an up to date resource to underpin the delivery of care and/or the assessment of the quality of care  A list of evaluated European Quality Indicators against which to measure future care in the last days of life in each of the WPs  Recommendations for the further development of the LCP framework  A fully functioning website for use during the collaborative project and beyond to facilitate communication and the sharing of information both within the collaboration and with the wider research community. The website will also provide a repository for the results of the systematic review and Delphi Process, including the list of evaluated 'technologies' and Quality Indicators which can be used as a resource for the wider research/healthcare community  Published articles and conference presentations detailing the results of the project from each of the primary work packages  A developmental evaluation of the process of collaboration within the project to support the future collaboration of the current group and to inform and advise other collaborations

Methods:	Methods - Work Packages 1-5 The specific methodologies (systematic review and Delphi) have been chosen because they represent recognised robust and systematic approaches to the collation and critique of evidence. These approaches are commonly used within the wider research community, and several members of the current collaboration have first hand experience of using them.
	Systematic literature review of published and unpublished literature will be undertaken to identify and critique current knowledge in the five primary areas.
	In addition, an adapted Delphi process will be undertaken to exploreand gain consensus re current clinical understanding in these areas particularly where the evidence base is poor.
	Methods - Work Package 7 The developmental evaluation of the project will entail a mixed methods approach to the collection of pertinent data that can be used to explore the 'workings' of the collaborative group and sub groupings to evaluate and provide ongoing feedback throughout the 3 year project regarding performance against the stated aims.
	Another important focus of this work package will be the development of the LCP within the international arena. This will be undertaken via discussion and debate within the seven planned Colloquia.
